Summary of Qualifications

Morgan Rieder received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of New Mexico in Historic Architecture in 1985 and 1990 respectively. His undergraduate and graduate studies emphasized historic and prehistoric Southwestern architecture and related aspects of material culture. As a graduate student he served for three years as field director for the Historic American Building Survey, HABS/HAER National Park Service, in the Southwest, recording prehistoric Native American and historic architecture. After graduation, he continued working in the field of cultural resource management. As an historical architect, he meets the professional qualifications specified in the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation. His experience in the field of historic architecture encompasses inventory and assessment, archival and graphic documentation, and preparation of National Register nominations.

In the field of archaeology, Rieder is a Registered Professional Archaeologist, and is experienced in the full range of technical studies for archaeological cultural resources: overviews, survey, testing, data recovery, artifact analysis, development of research designs, and evaluation of significance. Regionally, he has conducted archaeological investigations in Arizona, California, and New Mexico. His particular area of expertise is historical archaeology, but he has a broad range of experience in supervising archaeological testing and data recovery at both prehistoric and historic sites in southern and central Arizona.
