## II. PURPOSE OF AGREEMENT, PROBLEM/SOLUTION STATEMENT, AND GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

### A. Purpose of Agreement

The purpose of this Agreement is to fund the collaboration of organizations in the San Diego Region to provide and coordinate key services, assistance, resources, and infrastructure needed by entrepreneurs and researchers in the region to successfully bring to market energy innovations that can benefit Investor Owned Utility (IOU) electric ratepayers. The overall goal is to advance sustainable solutions for the benefit of job creation, decarbonization, and cost reduction for all members of the community.

### B. Problem/ Solution Statement

#### **Problem**

In 2016, Cleantech San Diego and project partners were awarded \$5 million to develop the San Diego Regional Energy Innovation Network—now the Southern California Energy Innovation

1 Network (SCEIN)—as part of the Electric Program Investment Charge (EPIC) Program. Through  
2 its local and regional network of private, public, and academic partnerships, Cleantech San Diego  
3 and SCEIN serve as a critical conduit between cleantech startups and a deep bench of industry  
4 professionals. Among its many valuable services, the program makes connections to potential  
5 customers and strategic partners, offers access to pilot project opportunities, and provides  
6 introductions to the investment community.  
7

8 Absent follow-on funding, future and current participating clean energy startups in SCEIN would  
9 lose critical support and potential raised capital that is vital for their path to commercialization.  
10 Discontinuing SCEIN would halt the established application pipeline and significantly reduce the  
11 momentum of the energy innovation industry and its outcomes, which benefit California  
12 ratepayers and the state’s clean energy future as a whole. Interruption in funding would also  
13 impede equity progress being made to bring the opportunities and benefits of clean energy to all  
14 Californians. While SCEIN is based in San Diego County, SCEIN also serves three other counties  
15 (Riverside, San Bernardino, and Imperial), which have much larger populations of underserved  
16 communities.  
17

18 **Solution**

19 The Recipient will continue to provide entrepreneurial services, including education/training,  
20 testing facilities, and resources in the San Diego Region to deliver custom service plans to energy  
21 entrepreneurs. Service plans will be optimized to overcome critical limitations to the development  
22 and commercialization of energy innovations. This will address the barrier of connecting region-  
23 specific needs to emerging technologies. The Recipient will also continue to address issues of  
24 energy equity and actively support diverse start-ups.  
25

26 **C. Goals and Objectives of the Agreement**

27  
28 **Agreement Goals**

29 The goals of this Agreement are to:

- 30 • Accelerate the commercialization of energy innovations in Imperial, Riverside, San  
31 Bernardino, and San Diego counties.
- 32 • Provide key services, infrastructure, expertise, and resources to energy entrepreneurs in  
33 their region to successfully deploy and commercialize their innovations.
- 34 • Connect emerging energy technologies to region-specific needs, opportunities, and  
35 assets.
- 36 • Promote economic growth and job creation in the region.
- 37 • Advance the San Diego Region in meeting the CEC’s statutory energy goals.
- 38 • Organize collaboration and regional planning around energy innovations that will benefit  
39 SDG&E and SCE ratepayers.
- 40 • Address climate equity by supporting and encouraging SCEIN companies to have  
41 employee diversity and provide affordable and innovative products and services that  
42 benefit all Californians.
- 43 • Expand SCEIN’s underserved community outreach and impact across all four served  
44 counties.

23 **PRODUCTS**

24 **Subtask 1.1 Products**

25 The goal of this subtask is to establish the requirements for submitting project products (e.g.,  
26 reports, summaries, plans, and presentation materials). Unless otherwise specified by the  
27 Commission Agreement Manager (CAM), the Recipient must deliver products as required below  
28 by the dates listed in the **Project Schedule (Part V)**. All products submitted which will be viewed  
29 by the public, must comply with the accessibility requirements of Section 508 of the federal  
30 Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (29 U.S.C. Sec. 794d), and regulations implementing that  
31 act as set forth in Part 1194 of Title 36 of the Federal Code of Regulations. All technical tasks  
32 should include product(s). Products that require a draft version are indicated by marking “**(draft  
33 and final)**” after the product name in the “Products” section of the task/subtask. If “(draft and  
34 final)” does not appear after the product name, only a final version of the product is required. With  
35 respect to due dates within this Scope of Work, “**days**” means working days.

The Recipient will bring its Project Manager and any other individuals designated by the CAM to this meeting. The administrative and technical aspects of the Agreement will be discussed at the meeting. Prior to the meeting, the Recipient will provide an agenda to all potential meeting participants. The meeting may take place in person or by electronic conferencing (e.g., WebEx), with approval of the CAM.

The administrative portion of the meeting will include discussion of the following:

- Terms and conditions of the Agreement;
- Invoicing and auditing procedures;
- Administrative products (subtask 1.1);
- CPR meetings (subtask 1.3);
- Match fund documentation (subtask 1.7);
- Permit documentation (subtask 1.8);
- Subcontracts (subtask 1.9); and
- Any other relevant topics.

The technical portion of the meeting will include discussion of the following:

- The CAM's expectations for accomplishing tasks described in the Scope of Work;
- An updated Project Schedule;
- Technical products (subtask 1.1);
- Progress reports (subtask 1.5);
- Final Report (subtask 1.6);
- Technical Advisory Committee meetings (subtasks 1.10 and 1.11); and
- Any other relevant topics.

11 **Subtask 1.3 Critical Project Review (CPR) Meetings**

12 The goal of this subtask is to determine if the project should continue to receive CEC funding, and  
13 if so whether any modifications must be made to the tasks, products, schedule, or budget. CPR  
14 meetings provide the opportunity for frank discussions between the CEC and the Recipient. As  
15 determined by the CAM, discussions may include project status, challenges, successes, advisory  
16 group findings and recommendations, final report preparation, and progress on technical transfer  
17 and production readiness activities (if applicable). Participants will include the CAM and the  
18 Recipient and may include the CAO and any other individuals selected by the CAM to provide  
19 support to the CEC.

20  
21 CPR meetings generally take place at key, predetermined points in the Agreement, as determined  
22 by the CAM and as shown in the Task List on page 1 of this Exhibit. However, the CAM may  
23 schedule additional CPR meetings as necessary. The budget will be reallocated to cover the  
24 additional costs borne by the Recipient, but the overall Agreement amount will not increase. CPR  
25 meetings generally take place at the CEC, but they may take place at another location, or may be  
26 conducted via electronic conferencing (e.g., WebEx) as determined by the CAM.

27  
28 **The Recipient shall:**

- 29     • Conduct a CPR meeting biannually with CAM and other any other CEC staff relevant to  
30 the Agreement.  
31     • Determine the location, date, and time of each CPR meeting with the CAM's input.  
32     • Prepare and submit a *CPR Agenda(s)* with a list of expected CPR participants in advance  
33 of the CPR meeting. If applicable, the agenda will include a discussion of match funding  
34 and permits.  
35     • Prepare and submit a *CPR Report(s)* for each CPR meeting that: (1) discusses the  
36 progress of the Agreement toward achieving its goals and objectives; and (2) includes  
37 recommendations and conclusions regarding continued work on the project.  
38     • Attend the CPR meeting.  
39     • Present the CPR Report and any other required information at each CPR meeting.

40  
41 **The CAM shall:**

- 42     • Make a record of each CPR meeting. Provide the Recipient with a schedule for providing  
43 a Progress Determination on continuation of the project.  
44     • Determine whether to continue the project, and if so whether modifications are needed to  
45 the tasks, schedule, products, or budget for the remainder of the Agreement. If the CAM  
46 concludes that satisfactory progress is not being made, this conclusion will be referred to  
47 the Deputy Director of the Energy Research and Development Division.

This meeting will be attended by the Recipient and CAM, at a minimum. The meeting may occur in person or by electronic conferencing (e.g., WebEx), with approval of the CAM.

The technical and administrative aspects of Agreement closeout will be discussed at the meeting, which may be divided into two separate meetings at the CAM's discretion.

- The technical portion of the meeting will involve the presentation of findings, conclusions, and recommended next steps (if any) for the Agreement. The CAM will determine the appropriate meeting participants.
- The administrative portion of the meeting will involve a discussion with the CAM and the CAO of the following Agreement closeout items:
