Agreement will not cause direct physical change in the environment or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment because: This project is sited within the jurisdiction of the City of Richmond (City). The City as lead agency made the determination that this project is exempt from CEQA under Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, § 15183 and the CEC is adopting those findings.

Specifically, on December 14, 2022, a public hearing was held by the City of Richmond Design Review Board, which considered approval of the project. The City of Richmond Design Review Board reviewed the Portside Commerce

Center CEQA Guidelines Section 15183 Checklist, which includes environmental analysis and considered the applicable provisions of CEQA and State CEQA Guidelines. This included Section 15183, which "mandates that projects that are consistent with the development established by existing zoning, community plan, or General Plan policies for which an Environmental Impact Report was certified shall not require additional environmental review, except as might be necessary to examine whether there are project-specific effects which are peculiar to the project or its Site."

Staff then considered the City of Richmond General Plan Update (Plan), which was adopted along with a certified Environmental Impact Report by the City of Richmond Development Services Department in August 2011 (since updated). Staff concluded that this project is consistent with the goals and policies of the Plan. The policies supported by the proposed battery assembly facility supports key goals from the Plan such as: EC5.1 which promotes Green Businesses and Jobs; LU3.J which support heavy industry's on-going efforts to modernize and upgrade their plants to reduce energy use, increase efficiency and reduce emissions; and LU4.A which support on-going efforts to plan and redevelop key shoreline areas to fully transform them from blighted areas into resources and amenities for the community.

The project is consistent with the site's existing map code zoning designation of "Industrial, Water-Related (IW) District."

Ultimately, the City of Richmond Design Review Board conditionally approved the project. The findings of the Hearing Officer included that the project was to be categorically exempt from the requirements for preparation of environmental documents pursuant to Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, § 15183. Since the project was found to be consistent with the goals and policies of the City of Richmond's General Plan Update and does not present any unusual circumstances, CEC is adopting the CEQA findings of the lead agency.

Background

The Budget Act of 2021 (Assembly Bill (AB) 128, Ting, Chapter 21, Statutes of 2021, as amended by Senate Bill (SB) 129, Skinner, Chapter 69, Statutes of 2021 and SB 170, Skinner, Chapter 240, Statutes of 2021) appropriated \$785,000,000 from the General Fund to support infrastructure deployments and manufacturing projects for zero-emission light-duty and medium-

and heavy-duty vehicles. The Budget Act of 2022 (SB 154, Skinner, Chapter 43, Statutes of 2022, as amended by AB 178, Ting, Chapter 45, Statutes of 2022) appropriated an additional \$255,000,000 from the General Fund to support infrastructure deployments and manufacturing projects for zero-emission light-duty and medium- and heavy-duty vehicles.

On March 30, 2022, the California Energy Commission (CEC) released a Grant Funding Opportunity (GFO) entitled "Zero-Emission Transportation Manufacturing." This competitive grant solicitation was to increase in-state manufacturing of zero-emission vehicles (ZEV), ZEV components and batteries, and ZEV charging or refueling equipment. In response to GFO-21-605, the Recipient submitted application #12 which was proposed for funding in the CEC's Notice of Proposed Awards on August 24, 2022. GFO-21-605 <u>application manual is hereby</u> <u>incorporated by reference into this Agreement in its entirety</u> and the Recipient's application are hereby incorporated by reference into this Agreement in their entirety.

On November 2024, the CEC approved a novation which replaced the primary grant recipient from Moxion Power Co. to Viridi Parente, Inc. (Recipient).

Problem Statement:

ZEV fleet operators <u>and others</u> need mobile <u>and stationary</u> battery <u>energy storage systems</u> (<u>BESS</u>) and battery energy storage charging solutions that will provide flexibility from the limitations of fixed charging infrastructure and accelerate the adoption of ZEV fleets. Fixed hardware charging ties entire fleets to the aging electric grid, which subjects them to demand charges. This often results in <u>the</u> inability to provide sufficient power without expensive service upgrades that may take years to complete due to utility resource constraints. The mobile nature of many fleet operations along with logistical obstacles of moving vehicles around on a site make fixed charging infrastructure inefficient, time consuming, and cost-prohibitive. Consequently, there is an immediate demand to manufacture batteries for mobile charging solutions to serve fleets, and, unfortunately, a high likelihood that the scaling of this battery manufacturing may occur outside California due to lower manufacturing costs.

Goals of the Agreement:

The goals of this Agreement are to:

- Build a world class <u>Establish a</u> battery <u>system, pack and module</u> manufacturing facility to support mobile ZEV <u>mobile and stationary</u> charging <u>and battery BESS</u> <u>technology</u> in Richmond, California, a disadvantaged community.
- Scale the manufacturing capacity and related supply chains to support ZEV <u>mobile and</u> <u>stationary</u> charging <u>and BESS</u> technology in California.
- Support California's ZEV deployment goals by manufacturing an industry-first ZEV charging solution <u>that has both mobile (or non-stationary), stationary and BESS</u> <u>technology</u>.
- Diversify the labor market from the fossil fuel industry in the City of Richmond.
- Support a successful local workforce development program.
- Decrease costs and improve economies of scale for mobile **and stationary** ZEV charging products **and BESS technology**.
- Help California achieve its decarbonization, air quality, and emissions reduction targets by accelerating the deployment of ZEVs <u>and BESS technology</u>.

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Scope of Work

ZVI-22-039<u>-01</u> Moxion Power Co. Viridi Parente, Inc.

Objectives of the Agreement:

The objectives of this Agreement are to:

- Create more than 400 <u>75</u> new, direct high-quality jobs in Richmond, California and support approximately <u>1,075</u><u>350</u> indirect jobs in California by the end of the grant term.
- Increase Moxion Power's <u>Recipient</u> supplier base to include over 38 <u>10</u> Californiabased companies.
- Add approximately \$320 ~ \$25 million to California's tax base by the end of the grant term.
- Scale production to <u>assemble and</u> manufacture over <u>75 MWh</u> of BESS, <u>packs and</u> modules to support more than <u>500</u> 10,000 mobile ZEV charging units by the end of the grant term.

TASK 1 ADMINISTRATION

Task 1.1 Attend Kick-off Meeting

The goal of this task is to establish the lines of communication and procedures for implementing this Agreement. The Commission Agreement Manager (CAM) shall designate the date and location of this meeting and provide an agenda to the Recipient prior to the meeting.

The Recipient shall:

- Attend a "Kick-Off" meeting with the CAM, the Commission Agreement Officer (CAO), and a representative of the CEC Accounting Office. The Recipient shall bring their Project Manager, Agreement Administrator, Accounting Officer, and any others determined necessary by the Recipient or specifically requested by the CAM to this meeting.
- Provide a written statement of project activities that have occurred after the notice of proposed awards but prior to the execution of the agreement using match funds. If none, provide a statement that no work has been completed using match funds prior to the execution of the agreement. All pre-execution match expenditures must conform to the requirements in the Terms and Conditions of this Agreement.
- Discuss the following administrative and technical aspects of this Agreement:
 - Agreement Terms and Conditions
 - Critical Project Review (Task 1.2)
 - Match fund documentation (Task 1.7) No reimbursable work may be done until this documentation is in place.
 - Permit documentation (Task 1.8)
 - Subawards needed to carry out project (Task 1.9)
 - The CAM's expectations for accomplishing tasks described in the Scope of Work
 - An updated Schedule of Products and Due Dates
 - Monthly Calls (Task 1.4)
 - Quarterly Progress Reports (Task 1.5)

Task 1.2 Critical Project Review (CPR) Meetings

CPRs provide the opportunity for frank discussions between the CEC and the Recipient. The goal of this task is to determine if the project should continue to receive CEC funding to complete this Agreement and to identify any needed modifications to the tasks, products, schedule or budget.

The CAM may schedule CPR meetings as necessary, and meeting costs will be borne by the Recipient.

Meeting participants include the CAM and the Recipient and may include the CAO, the Fuels and Transportation Division (FTD) program lead, other CEC staff and Management as well as other individuals selected by the CAM to provide support to the CEC.

The CAM shall:

- Determine the location, date, and time of each CPR meeting with the Recipient. These meetings generally take place at the CEC, but they may take place at another location or remotely.
- Send the Recipient the agenda and a list of expected participants in advance of each CPR. If applicable, the agenda shall include a discussion on both match funding and permits.
- Conduct and make a record of each CPR meeting. Prepare a schedule for providing the written determination described below.
- Determine whether to continue the project, and if continuing, whether or not modifications are needed to the tasks, schedule, products, and/or budget for the remainder of the Agreement. Modifications to the Agreement may require a formal amendment (please see section 8 of the Terms and Conditions). If the CAM concludes that satisfactory progress is not being made, this conclusion will be referred to the Lead Commissioner for Transportation for his or her concurrence.
- Provide the Recipient with a written determination in accordance with the schedule. The written response may include a requirement for the Recipient to revise one or more product(s) that were included in the CPR.

The Recipient shall:

- Prepare a CPR Report for each CPR that discusses the progress of the Agreement toward achieving its goals and objectives. This report shall include recommendations and conclusions regarding continued work of the projects. This report shall be submitted along with any other products identified in this scope of work. The Recipient shall submit these documents to the CAM and any other designated reviewers at least 15 working days in advance of each CPR meeting.
- Present the required information at each CPR meeting and participate in a discussion about the Agreement.

Task 1.3 Final Meeting

The goal of this task is to closeout this Agreement.

The Recipient shall:

• Meet with CEC staff to present the findings, conclusions, and recommendations. The final meeting must be completed during the closeout of this Agreement.

This meeting will be attended by, at a minimum, the Recipient and the CAM. The technical and administrative aspects of Agreement closeout will be discussed at the meeting, which may be two separate meetings at the discretion of the CAM.

The technical portion of the meeting shall present an assessment of the degree to which project and task goals and objectives were achieved, findings, conclusions, recommended next steps (if any) for the Agreement, and recommendations for improvements. The CAM will determine the appropriate meeting participants.

The administrative portion of the meeting shall be a discussion with the CAM about the following Agreement closeout items:

- What to do with any equipment purchased with CEC funds (Options)
- CEC request for specific "generated" data (not already provided in Agreement products)
- Need to document Recipient's disclosure of "subject inventions" developed under the Agreement
- "Surviving" Agreement provisions
- Final invoicing and release of retention
- Prepare a schedule for completing the closeout activities for this Agreement.

Task 1.4 Monthly Calls

The goal of this task is to have calls at least monthly between CAM and Recipient to verify that satisfactory and continued progress is made towards achieving the objectives of this Agreement on time and within budget.

The objectives of this task are to verbally summarize activities performed during the reporting period, to identify activities planned for the next reporting period, to identify issues that may affect performance and expenditures, to verify match funds are being proportionally spent concurrently or in advance of CEC funds or are being spent in accordance with an approved Match Funding Spending Plan, to form the basis for determining whether invoices are consistent with work performed, and to answer any other questions from the CAM. Monthly calls might not be held on those months when a quarterly progress report is submitted, or the CAM determines that a monthly call is unnecessary.

The CAM shall:

- Schedule monthly calls.
- Provide questions to the Recipient prior to the monthly call.
- Provide call summary notes to Recipient of items discussed during call.

The Recipient shall:

- Review the questions provided by CAM prior to the monthly call
- Provide verbal answers to the CAM during the call.

Task 1.5 Quarterly Progress Reports

The goal of this task is to periodically verify that satisfactory and continued progress is made towards achieving the objectives of this Agreement on time and within budget.

The objectives of this task are to summarize activities performed during the reporting period, to identify activities planned for the next reporting period, to identify issues that may affect performance and expenditures, and to form the basis for determining whether invoices are consistent with work performed.

The Recipient shall:

• Prepare a Quarterly Progress Report which summarizes all Agreement activities conducted by the Recipient for the reporting period, including an assessment of the ability to complete the Agreement within the current budget and any anticipated cost overruns. Progress reports are due to the CAM the 10th day of each January, April, July, and October. The Quarterly Progress Report template can be found on the ECAMS Resources webpage available at https://www.energy.ca.gov/media/4691.

Task 1.6 Final Report

The goal of the Final Report is to assess the project's success in achieving the Agreement's goals and objectives, advancing science and technology, and providing energy-related and other benefits to California.

The objectives of the Final Report are to clearly and completely describe the project's purpose, approach, activities performed, results, and advancements in science and technology; to present a public assessment of the success of the project as measured by the degree to which goals and objectives were achieved; to make insightful observations based on results obtained; to draw conclusions; and to make recommendations for further projects and improvements to the FTD project management processes.

The Final Report shall be a public document and is limited to 25-pages. If the Recipient has obtained confidential status from the CEC and will be preparing a confidential version of the Final Report as well, the Recipient shall perform the following activities for both the public and confidential versions of the Final Report.

In addition to any other applicable requirements, the Final Report must comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability; all applicable regulations and guidelines issued pursuant to the ADA; Cal. Gov. Code sects. 7405 and 11135; and Web Content Accessibility Guidelines 2.0, or a subsequent version, as published by the Web Accessibility Initiative of the World Wide Web Consortium at a minimum Level AA success criteria.

The Recipient shall:

- Prepare an Outline of the Final Report, if requested by the CAM.
- Prepare a Final Report complying with ADA requirements and following the latest version of the Final Report guidelines which will be provided by the CAM. The CAM shall provide written comments on the Draft Final Report within fifteen (15) working days of receipt. The Final Report must be completed at least 60 days before the end of the Agreement Term.
- Submit Final Report in Microsoft Word format or similar electronic format as approved by the CAM.

Task 1.7 Identify and Obtain Matching Funds

The goal of this task is to ensure that the match funds planned for this Agreement are obtained for and applied to this Agreement during the term of this Agreement.

The costs to obtain and document match fund commitments are not reimbursable through this Agreement. Although the CEC budget for this task will be zero dollars, the Recipient may utilize match funds for this task. Match funds must be identified in writing and the associated commitments obtained before the Recipient can incur any costs for which the Recipient will request reimbursement.

The Recipient shall:

- Prepare a letter documenting the match funding committed to this Agreement and submit it to the CAM at least 2 working days prior to the kick-off meeting. If no match funds were part of the proposal that led to the CEC awarding this Agreement and none have been identified at the time this Agreement starts, then state such in the letter. If match funds were a part of the proposal that led to the CEC awarding this Agreement, then provide in the letter a list of the match funds that identifies the:
 - Amount of each cash match fund, its source, including a contact name, address and telephone number and the task(s) to which the match funds will be applied.
 - Amount of each in-kind contribution, a description, documented market or book value, and its source, including a contact name, address and telephone number and the task(s) to which the match funds will be applied. If the in-kind contribution is equipment or other tangible or real property, the Recipient shall identify its owner and provide a contact name, address and telephone number, and the address where the property is located.
- Provide a copy of the letter of commitment from an authorized representative of each source of cash match funding or in-kind contributions that these funds or contributions have been secured. For match funds provided by a grant a copy of the executed grant shall be submitted in place of a letter of commitment.
- Discuss match funds and the implications to the Agreement if they are reduced or not obtained as committed, at the kick-off meeting. If applicable, match funds will be included as a line item in the progress reports and will be a topic at CPR meetings.
- Provide the appropriate information to the CAM if during the course of the Agreement additional match funds are received.
- Notify the CAM within 10 days if during the course of the Agreement existing match funds are reduced. Reduction in match funds must be approved through a formal amendment to the Agreement and may trigger an additional CPR meeting.

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Task 1.8 Identify and Obtain Required Permits

The goal of this task is to obtain all permits required for work completed under this Agreement in advance of the date they are needed to keep the Agreement schedule on track.

Permit costs and the expenses associated with obtaining permits are not reimbursable under this Agreement. Although the CEC budget for this task will be zero dollars, the Recipient may budget match funds for any expected expenditures associated with obtaining permits. Permits must be identified in writing and obtained before the Recipient can make any expenditure for which a permit is required.

The Recipient shall:

- Prepare a letter documenting the permits required to conduct this Agreement and submit it to the CAM at least 2 working days prior to the kick-off meeting. If there are no permits required at the start of this Agreement, then state such in the letter. (California Entity Number 5286090, Transferee), and the California Energy Commission, hereinafter referred to as the Energy Commission, in consideration of the promises made herein, agree as follows:

- 6. Any effort to enforce this Novation Agreement in court shall be venued in Sacramento County.
- 7. This Novation Agreement can only be modified in writing by the parties.
- 8. This Novation Agreement shall be interpreted in accordance with and governed in all respects by California law.
- 9. If any term, condition, or provision in this Novation Agreement is found to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable to any extent, the invalid term, condition, or provision will be severed from the remaining terms, conditions and provisions, which will continue to be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.
