Santa Ynez Band of Chumash Indians. Proposed resolution approving agreement TCA-24-013 with the Santa Ynez Band of Chumash Indians for a \$200,000 grant and adopting staff's recommendation that this action is exempt from CEQA. This agreement will conduct an indepth assessment of the severity and range of coastal hazard exposures in the South-Central Coast. The proposed project will build on a prior study of sea level rise and coastal hazards near 33 Chumash village areas and create a matrix of adaptive measures recommended by the Chumash community. This project is covered by the Common Sense Exemption under 14 CCR 15061 (b) (3) that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment. Where it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to CEQA.

This project is a research activity incorporating costal hazards data into an information system database of archaeological sites and ethnographic information to enhance the capacity and capability of the Tribe to engage and consult on future vulnerability assessments and climate adaptation plans. The project will provide an in-depth characterization of the severity of existing and future coastal hazards on coastal Chumash village sites. All project activities will occur on Santa Ynez Band of Chumash Indians' reservation. Project activities do not include burning or any other activity that may have an impact to land off of Santa Ynez Band of Chumash Indians' reservation.

In order for the CEC to comply with CEQA, the CEC must evaluate any impacts to land within the jurisdiction of the State of California, which is therefore limited to potential impacts of the project off of Santa Ynez Band of Chumash Indians' reservation. This project is exempt under the "common sense" CEQA exemption because the proposed project will not:

- construct on or alter any land subject to jurisdiction of the State of California;
- · impact local air quality;
- use groundwater resources or otherwise impact any water resources that might be subject to jurisdiction of the State of California;
- build additional transportation infrastructure;
- · increase vehicle miles traveled:
- increase ambient noise beyond the existing activities; or
- degrade the visual character or quality of views, including those of scenic resources or objects of aesthetic significance on land subject to the jurisdiction of the State of California.

Because the proposed project does not provide for any physical changes outside of Santa Ynez Band of Chumas Indians' reservation, it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the proposed project may have a significant effect on the environment within the jurisdiction of the State of California. Based on all these factors, the proposed project meets the CEQA "common sense" exemption.

The project will not impact an environmental resource of hazardous or critical concern where designated, precisely mapped, and officially adopted pursuant to law by federal, state, or local agencies; does not involve any cumulative impacts of successive projects of the same type in the same place that might be considered significant; does not involve unusual circumstances that might have a significant effect on the environment; will not result in damage to scenic resources within a highway officially designated as a state scenic highway; the project site is not included on any list compiled pursuant to Government Code section 65962.5; and the project will not cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource. Therefore, none of the exceptions to categorical exemptions listed in CEQA Guidelines section 15300.2 apply to this project and this project will not have a significant effect on the environment.
