TZICATL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION. Proposed resolution approving agreement TCA-24-017 with Tzicatl Community Development Corporation for a \$183,723 grant, and adopting staff's recommendation that this action is exempt from CEQA. This agreement will establish the Masewaltlapixkayiotl Indigenous Youth Climate Resilience Corps on a tribal site in Los Angeles with a hands-on, experiential learning program teaching indigenous land stewardship practices. Cal. Code Regs., tit., 14, Section 15304 provides that projects that consist of minor public or private alterations in the condition of land, water, and/or vegetation which do not involve removal of healthy, mature, scenic trees except for forestry or agricultural purposes are exempt from CEQA. This project is establishing a climate resilience tribal youth education program and is situated in an urban environment that precludes any burning. Activities of this project consist of research on cultural burn practices, coppicing, and cultivation of native plant species, workshops and consultation with tribal elders and experts, curriculum development from the information gathered, student recruitment, and teaching and field data collection. These educational activities will be conducted on 12 acres of land in Los Angeles owned by the recipient. Teaching on cultural burn will utilize non-fire-based methods that mimic the ecological impact of cultural fires, such as manual weed removal and other hands-on practices designed to achieve outcomes similar to cultural burning. Teaching on coppicing will not involve actual coppicing. Thus, this project is exempt under Section 15304.

Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, Section 15306 provides that projects which consist of basic data collection, research, experimental management, and resource evaluation activities which do not result in a serious or major disturbance to an environmental resource are exempt from CEQA. This project involves research, data gathering, resource evaluation and consultations and curriculum development. Thus, this project is exempt under Section 15306.

This project does not involve impacts on any particularly sensitive environment; does not involve any cumulative impacts of successive projects of the same type in the

same place that might be considered significant; does not involve unusual circumstances that might have a significant effect on the environment; will not result in damage to scenic resources within a highway officially designated as a state scenic highway; the project site is not included on any list compiled pursuant to Government Code section 65962.5; and the project will not cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource. Overview:

Establishing the Masewaltlapixkayiotl Indigenous Youth Climate Resilience Corps Program is a collaborative effort between Tzicatl Community Development Corporation, Gabrielino-Shoshone Nation of Southern California (GSNSC), and Anahuacalmecac International University Preparatory of North America to educate and train young leaders to mitigate future wildfires, water scarcity, and climate crisis by means of regenerative Indigenous science on 12 acres of land recently returned to the GSNSC, an Indigenous People who occupied the Greater Los Angeles Basin until the Spanish arrival in 1771. The GSNSC and other local and regional Indigenous organizations envisioned a future of ecological sustainability, ecosystem restoration, and cultural education in this natural space--a site of intergenerational learning and connection fostering increased community and ecological sustainability.

Several public and private sector partners will collaborate with the project team and participating Indigenous youth will engage tribal elders and be supported by Indigenous community organizations and other entities. This project aims to revitalize and regenerate Indigenous culture and train the next generation Indigenous leaders, and promote exchange between generations.

The goals of this project are:

- Engage native experts from the Gabrielino Shoshone Nation in the use of Indigenous wildfire mitigation practices
- Utilize a youth job corps model (youth stipend & certificate) engaging grade 9-12 students, teachers, and partners at Anahuacalmecac International University Preparatory of North America employing a hands-on, experiential learning program ensuring these practices are passed to the next generation while providing no-cost education vocational training
- Leverage community partnerships and collaborations ensuring widespread adoption and city, local, state buy-in
