# **March En Banc Meeting**

On March 2nd tribes and state agencies held an En Banc, a joint convening of **CEC** and Public Utilities **Commission Commissioners** and tribal leaders, to share perspectives and priorities on advancing clean energy.

## **Energy Sovereignty Resolution**

The CEC recognizes the inherent sovereignty of California Native American tribes and that energy resources, including energy reliability, are a critical component of daily life, community independence, self-government, and sovereignty.

#### Goals:

Increased tribal access to funding and consultation

#### Actions:

- Develop capacity and technical assistance resources
- Dedicated tribal set-asides
- Protect tribal cultural resources in planning clean energy projects

# CEC Clean Transportation Program and Investment Plan

Through an annual investment plan the Clean Transportation Program (CTP) was created to invest in a cleaner, healthier transportation system.

- Established by <u>Assembly Bill 118 (Núñez, 2007)</u> extended to January 1, 2024 by <u>Assembly Bill 8 (Perea, 2013)</u>.
- CTP Invests in:
  - Zero Emission Vehicle (ZEV) infrastructure
  - Workforce development
  - ZEV technology advancement
  - Clean technology manufacturing



# **Current Funding Opportunities**

### **Light-duty EV Charging Infrastructure**

- CA Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Project (<u>CALeVIP</u>)
  - CALeVIP 1.0 & <u>CALeVIP 2.0</u> block grant to provide incentives for the purchase and installation of light-duty electric vehicle (EV) chargers.
- <u>Communities in Charge</u> block grant in collaboration with CALSTART for Light-Duty Electric Vehicle Charger Incentive Projects
- Convenient, High-Visibility, Low-Cost, Level 2 Charging (CHiLL-2) competitive grant solicitation for reliable and accessible Level 2 electric vehicle (EV) charger deployment


#### MD/HD EV Charging Infrastructure

 Energy Infrastructure Incentives for Zero-Emission Commercial Vehicles (<u>EnergIIZE</u>) - commercial vehicle fleet infrastructure incentive project for medium- and heavy-duty battery electric and hydrogen fuel cell vehicles in California



## **Obstacles to CTP Tribal Participation**

- High demand for limited funding
- Few funding opportunities for:
  - Resiliency technology
  - Technical assistance
  - Capacity building needs

# **Solicitation Concept - Objectives**

## **Solicitation Objective:**

- Accelerate electric vehicle (EV) adoption among California Native American Tribes
  - Dedicated, tribal-specific solicitation for EV infrastructure
  - Increase EV access for tribes
- Create incentives that support reliable and resilient EV infrastructure, which can increase tribal energy access for transportation end uses



# **Solicitation Concept - Scope**

- Avoid duplicative consultation
- Focus on areas of significant need
  - CTP cannot fund vehicle incentives and likely can't fund alternative transportation if it requires vehicle incentives.

Tribal Priorities	Average Score (0-3)
ZEV Planning	2.32
EV Infrastructure	2.28
EV Vehicle Incentives	2.15

 The CEC proposes to fund resilient EV charging infrastructure and seeks input on the value of ZEV planning funding.



# Solicitation - Applicable Projects


- ZEV planning, workforce training and development
- EV infrastructure
- Resiliency equipment (integrated with EV infrastructure)
  - Behind-the-meter (BTM) stationary energy storage
  - Renewable generation
  - Off-grid charging technology
